Welcome to new sites


We are now achieving approximately 75 patients per month recruitment and with more sites coming on board we expect this number to rise in the next few months.

Important things to remember

The response rate for the sexual history questionnaire is lower than for other questionnaires. When you are giving the questionnaires to the patients, please will you emphasise to them that this is an important part of the study and their answers will be very useful in the examination of the causes of oral cancers.

Pathology tissue samples are being received at the trial office without the appropriate pathology form to accompany them. Please ensure the correct forms are sent in with each sample with the patient identifier number only on the form, patient names should be removed.

It is very important that the patient number is recorded on each page of the questionnaires, we know this is a tedious task but questionnaires have been received in the Trial office with no patient identifiers which leads to extra work trying to find out which site the patient is from. Also with so many patients in the study we need extra vigilance in ensuring patient forms are correctly completed by the research teams.

NEW STUDY

(Data will be collected by Holly Cole-Hawkins as part of her PhD; from Bristol only)

Survivorship in people with oral cancer and their partners: a study examining the patient and partner journey over twelve months from diagnosis, using diaries, interviews and quality of life measures.

Using the HN5000 quality of life data, this study will investigate what it means to be a survivor of oral cancer or have a partner who is a survivor. It will assess how both the diagnosis of and treatments for oral cancer affect quality of life in people with oral cancer. We will examine the impact of changes to people's appearance, support needs and changes to relationships.

In addition to the above, fifteen people with oral cancer and eight of their partners will take part in one-to-one semi-structured qualitative interviews at three time points: diagnosis, four months following diagnosis and 12 months following diagnosis. They will also be asked to complete diaries about their experiences over a period of nine months after diagnosis.

The results of this study investigating survivorship will provide additional data about the impact that a diagnosis of oral cancer has and it will help with the development of interventions to provide appropriate support during this difficult time.
